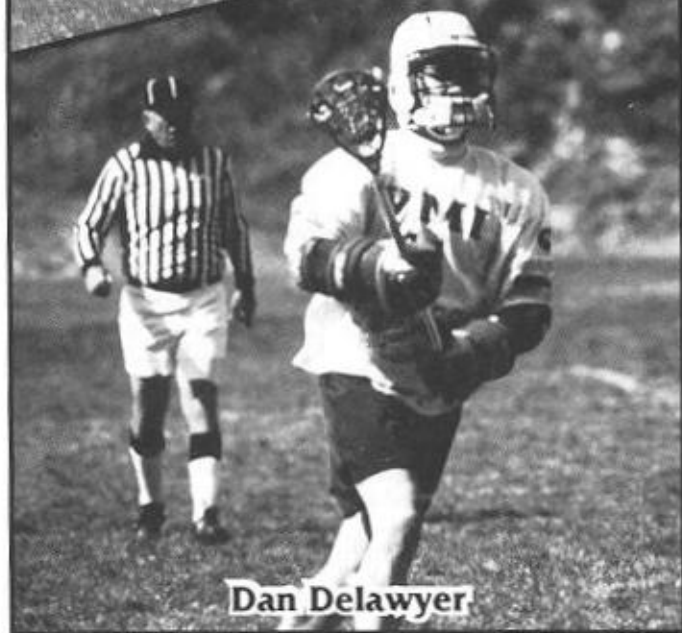
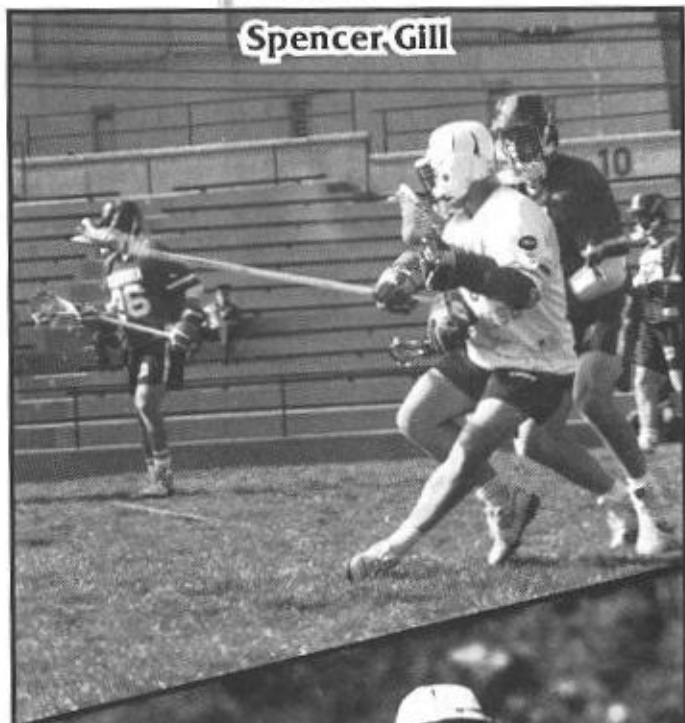

**Doug Bartlett**  
Head Lacrosse Coach  
Eighth Season

Doug Bartlett enters his eighth season at the helm of the VMI Lacrosse program. Only once in that span, his debut season, has his team registered more losses than wins. He brought stability to a fledgling program which did not obtain varsity status at VMI until 1983, and his VMI record of 53-

39 is a tribute to him and the players he has recruited.

In the past seven seasons, Bartlett's accomplishments with the Keydet lacrosse program are unprecedented. His 1992 team, following their 13-10 defeat of #13 UMBC, were ranked in the Top 25 lacrosse poll, only the fourth team in VMI history to be ranked in a national poll. He has compiled a .589 winning percentage since coming to VMI, the second highest winning percentage of any coach currently at VMI, and the program's overall winning percentage is the third best among VMI's 13 intercollegiate sports.

Remarkably, this phenomenal level of success which Coach Bartlett has achieved year in and year out has come against some of the top teams in the country; his schedule is regularly peppered with lacrosse final four and top 25 teams such as Virginia, Maryland, UMBC, and North Carolina.

Overall as a head lacrosse coach, Bartlett enjoys a 63-42 record, which is an incredible .600 winning percentage.

Coach Bartlett's coaching excellence and accomplishments at VMI were recognized by his peers this past summer when he was selected as a coach for the South team in the 50th Annual North / South Lacrosse Classic. Bartlett was chosen to work alongside legendary Georgetown Coach Dave Urlick, who coached Hobart College to ten national championships.

Coach Bartlett has developed a reputation as a coach who pushes his players to excel on the field and who pushes himself in the recruiting wars to obtain top notch lacrosse athletes for his program and for VMI. He commands the respect of his players, he is a true teacher of the game, and he has been able to motivate his teams to achieve their annual goal of a winning season.

Bartlett is a 1970 graduate of SUNY-Geneseo, where he started on the lacrosse team for four years. He previously coached at Radford University, first as an assistant and then as head coach. Doug and his wife Sarah are the proud parents of two daughters, Jessie (4) and Kelsey (1).



**David Hope**  
Assistant Lacrosse Coach

David Hope, a 1989 VMI graduate, joined the lacrosse staff prior to the 1991 season as the Keydets' first full time assistant.

He played under Bartlett and left the Institute as the all-time leading scorer with 239 points. Over the final three years of his playing career, he ranked in the Division I Top 10 in both goals scored and total points each season. In 1987 he led the nation

in goals scored with 57.

After receiving his BA degree in English, he moved back to his hometown of Norfolk, Virginia and coach for a year and a half at Virginia Wesleyan College as a assistant lacrosse coach.

"David has been a tremendous addition to our program," said Bartlett. "He knows the game from a players' perspective and can easily relate to them, and he has developed excellent coaching techniques in both practice and game situations."

Senior • Midfield • Towson, Maryland

Scored seven goals and had three assists in 1992...solid player with a reputation for excellent stickwork...has real knack for getting open even in traffic...a great cutter into open field...played in all 14 of the Keydets contests last season...should see some starting time in 1993.

The 1992 VMI lacrosse season is one worth remembering.

VMI defeated national power #13 UMBC 13-10 down on Patchin Field early in the season, earning votes to be ranked in the Top 25 of the USILA national poll. In doing so, they became only the fourth team in any varsity sport at VMI to earn a national ranking.

The team finished with a 9-5 record, smashing various team scoring records during the course of the season.

Senior defenseman Bill Berry was awarded an NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship, the first won by a member of the lacrosse team and first won by a VMI athlete in five years.

Head Coach Doug Bartlett was honored by his peers for his lacrosse coaching excellence by being named as a coach for the South team in the 50th annual North/South Lacrosse Classic. Bartlett's fellow coach for the South team was none other than coaching legend Dave Urlick of Georgetown, who won ten national championships at Hobart College.

It was definitely a season to savor.

What Coach Bartlett and the Keydet lacrosse team would like to do is replace those memories of a successful 1992 season with the vision of an even more successful 1993 campaign.

While the Keydets have lost defenseman Bill Berry and goalie Matt Ott, two keys to the Keydets' success in 1992, VMI still returns its top three scorers of a year ago who should provide ample firepower in '93.

The Keydet defense will be anchored by sophomore transfer Jason Pifer, a solid defender whom Bartlett calls "a monster waiting to be unleashed." Possibly joining Pifer on the back line will be David Youngclaus, who moves back to defense from long-stick middle, and Todd Denny, a three-year starter for the Keydets who returns to the lineup after taking a year off. The Keydets have several individuals who can step in off the bench, including Tom Ripley, Don Spears, Chris Brinkac, Lakei Evans and Andrew Armiger. Any of these guys can play either in close or the long-stick midfielder position, and according to Coach Bartlett "give us more depth at this position than we've had in some time."

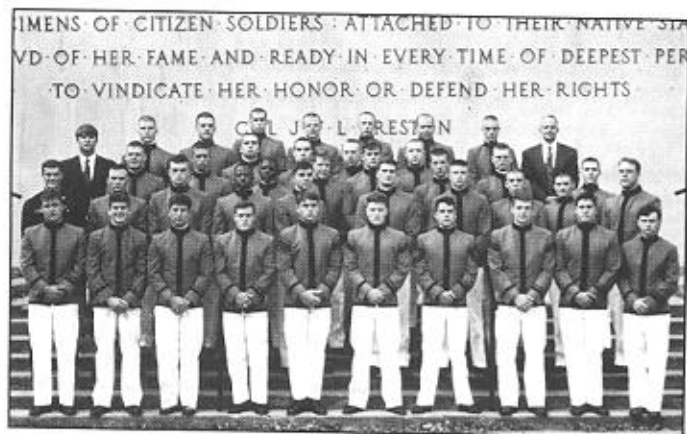
The VMI midfield in 1993 has the personnel to switch from an offensive setting to a defensive one and then back again in a heartbeat. When the offense needs a push, the Keydets will rely on Spencer Gill to do the damage. Gill led VMI in goals last season with 42, and also had 16 assists for 58 points. John Westfall, a two-year starter for the Keydets, returns to bolster the VMI midfield after taking a season off. VMI gets additional support from Tim Ervin, Chris Doyle, and freshmen Joe Brockman and David Belfiore. When the defense needs assistance, the Keydets will call on Marc Mueller, probably VMI's top defensive middle. Rounding out the defensive specialists are Jack Collins and Clayton Ricks. Ricks gives the Keydet midfield a "speed kills" philosophy; according to Coach Bartlett not only is Ricks fast enough to cover up his own mistakes, but he can capitalize on other people's.

Starting at the attack positions will be Dan Delawyer, who was second on the team in scoring last year with 30 goals and 19 assists, and Mike Peters, who finished right behind Delawyer on the scoring chart with 28 goals and 13 assists. The third attack spot is wide open, although strong candidates to fill it include freshmen Kyle Graham and Jason Dobson.

The Keydets will not be hurting for a goalie either, with two excellent candidates vying for the position. Both Rich Weatherly and Mark Cameron can step in at any time, and they will battle for the starting position.

The Keydets will once again play a challenging schedule filled with some of the top lacrosse programs in the country. Highlighting VMI's schedule will be games with top 20 teams Virginia, North Carolina, Maryland, and UMBC. In addition to contests with Lehigh, Mount St. Mary's and Ohio State, rounding out the season will be the annual Lee-Jackson Lacrosse Classic against cross-town rival Washington & Lee, which will take place on VMI's Alumni Memorial Field.

### Kyle Graham ● Endicott, NY ● Attack

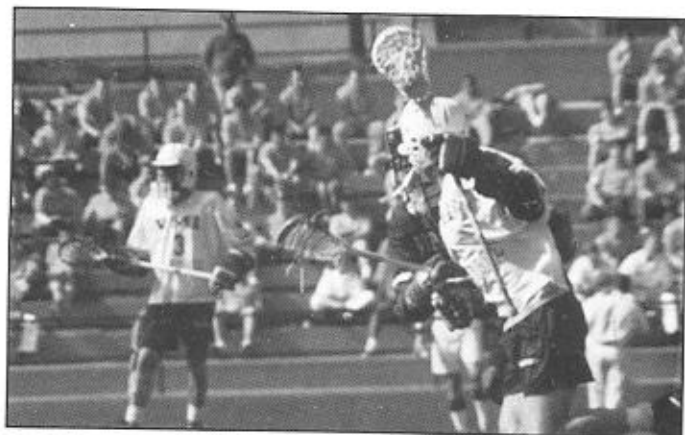

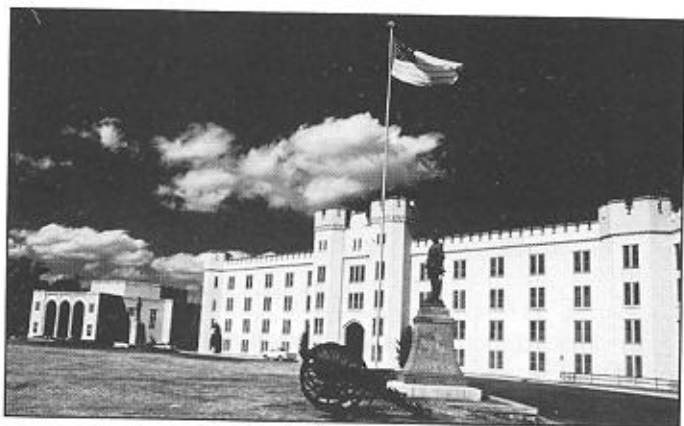

# Virginia Military Institute



Founded in 1839 as the nation's first state military college, the Virginia Military Institute has made major contributions to the development of America higher education. Civil Engineering, a subject rarely taught in colleges and universities before 1839, was established at the founding of VMI as the corner stone of its program. The first industrial chemistry course in the south was developed at VMI by Commodore Matthew Fontaine Maury. Today, VMI's demanding academic program reflects the established needs and the emerging trends of a constantly changing society.

VMI is a state-supported undergraduate college for young men. It offers a choice of majors from the general fields of engineering, liberal arts, and the sciences. Programs leading to the bachelor degree include biology, chemistry, civil engineering, computer science, economics & business, electrical engineering, English, history, International studies, mathematics, mechanical engineering, modern languages, and physics. All academic courses are taught by fulltime faculty members, 80 percent of whom hold the doctorate degree. Successful completion of the VMI program enables cadets to enter many civilian professions, the Armed Forces, or to continue at graduate, medical, and law schools.

The challenging military portion of the VMI program is a distinctive aspect of the VMI college experience, and it reflects the Institute's debt to the United States Military Academy and the prestigious Ecole Polytechnique in Paris, France. All students at VMI are members of the Corps of Cadets. The Department of Defense maintains Army, Naval and Air Force ROTC units and cadets are required to take eight semesters of ROTC classes and encouraged to seek commissions in these three branches of the Armed Forces. Commissions are available, if cadets meet the necessary standards, and are contingent upon the needs of the Department of Defense. While the military program is an important part of the overall VMI experience, it is only one of several functions of the Institute. Historically, only about seventeen percent of VMI's graduates have chosen military careers. The Institute's programs have been based on the concept of the citizen-soldier, a man prepared to take his place in civilian life, but ready to respond in times of national military need.

Almost from the first day of its founding, VMI men have served America in many fields of endeavor. More than 14,000 graduates since 1839 have moved from cadet life to enter finance, business, industry, government service, and the professions. In the military, VMI men have held top command posts. The Chief of Staff, the Deputy Chief of Staff of the United States Army in World War II, and two former commandants of the U.S. Marine Corps were VMI graduates. Distinguished service by other VMI men has been rewarded through a variety of honors, including a Nobel Peace Prize, Congressional Medals of Honor, Rhodes Scholarships, and numerous recognitions for community and state service.
