## BRIAN GRADY

### ASSISTANT COACH

#### ST. LAWRENCE '89

Brian Grady begins his second season as an assistant to Coach Bartlett, coaching the attackmen and goalies. Grady is also an instructor in the Physical Education Department, and is the Athletic Department's assistant strength and conditioning coach. The physical conditioning of the team has improved considerably under his tutelage as well as the team's offensive output.

Grady received his B.S. in sport and leisure studies in 1989 from St. Lawrence University, where he was a two-year letterwinner in lacrosse as an attackman.

He did graduate work at the University of Virginia, where he received his Master's in exercise physiology in 1994.

He began his coaching career at Bay Shore Middle School (1989-90), before being named head lacrosse coach at The Shipley School, where he served two seasons and posted a 12-15 record. While pursuing his M.Ed. at Virginia, he was a graduate assistant strength and conditioning coach for the Cavaliers' athletic program. Following graduation from Virginia, he was head varsity coach at Fork Union Military Academy for the 1994 season, posting a 5-5 record.

A native of West Islip, New York, Grady resides in Lexington with his wife Jean.



## SPENCER GILL

### ASSISTANT COACH

#### VMI '93

Former VMI standout Spencer Gill returns for his second season at his alma mater to work with his former coach as an assistant. Gill will coordinate the offense for Coach Bartlett, and coach the midfielders. Under his guidance, the offense rewrote the VMI record books last year.

A 1993 graduate with distinction from the Institute with a degree in biology, Gill is listed in the top 10 in the VMI lacrosse record book in career goals, assists, and points.

Following graduation, Gill worked for the English Lacrosse Union as a development officer while playing for the Boardman & Eccles club team in Manchester, England. He has also played with a touring team from the English Lacrosse Union in the Czech Republic, and worked summer camps at VMI and Denison University. Recently he made the roster of the Charlotte Cobras of the Major Indoor Lacrosse League.

The Richmond, Virginia native is engaged to Meredith Cook, and resides in Lexington.



## STACEY QUINN, A.T.C.

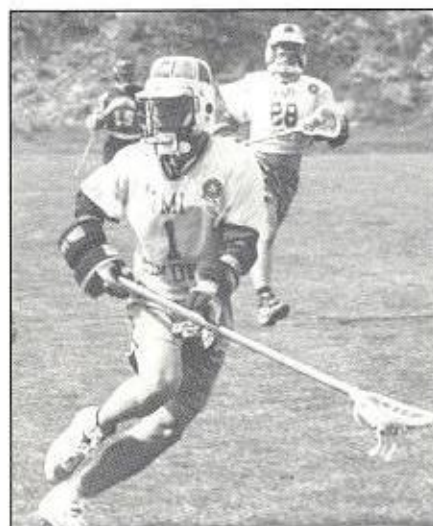
### ASSISTANT ATHLETIC TRAINER

#### SALISBURY STATE '91

Stacey Quinn is a 1991 graduate of Salisbury State University, with a B.S. in liberal studies/athletic training. She pursued her Masters of Science degree in education with an emphasis in athletic training from Old Dominion University, and received her degree in the spring of 1993. She concurrently served her practicum at Norfolk State University in Norfolk, VA, from 1991-93. She was certified by the National Athletic Trainers' Association in May 1991. In addition to her responsibilities with lacrosse, Quinn also works with the VMI football

program.

Quinn, a native of Frederick, Maryland, is married to assistant football coach Dan Quinn.

for VMI this year. The Keydets return its top five scorers from a team that broke virtually every team offensive record in 1995. Included in this group are all three starters at the attack position.

Rob Worell, Joe Brockman and Rusty Perrino combined for 92 goals and 65 assists up front last year. Worell accounted for 36 of the goals and 34 of the assists to lead the team in scoring in 1995 as a sophomore. He is the type of person that knows how to score and doesn't let defensive pressure rattle him on the field. Brockman's 39 goals were tops on the team last year and his 3.0 goals per game mark was among the leaders in the nation. A physical player, he is able to use his size to break through opponent's defenses to set up scoring opportunities.

After having only three attackmen on the roster in 1995, Coach Bartlett has the luxury of having seven this season. Chris Feltmann returns after a year off, providing instant depth and experience on the attack. Feltmann notched 22 points two years ago. A freshman who impressed in the fall and will push for playing time is Mason Ayers, brother of goalkeeper Charles Ayers. Both Feltmann and Ayers have impressed with their work at midfield as well, providing the Keydets with valuable, versatile depth.

**MIDFIELD** - At midfield VMI returns its top faceoff man in the person of Mike Daegan. He won almost 55 percent of his faceoffs last year and is a player who is equally capable on the attack as he is on defense.

John Ripley and David Belfiore return as the top scoring threats from midfield. In 1995 they were third and fourth respectively in scoring with 46 and 41 points. Both are good athletes who have the ability to cut to the goal and score, a role they will continue in this year.

The defensive midfielders also return with depth and experience. Senior Matt Modarelli will pick up the duties as a starter at short-stick after seeing action in eight games a year ago. One of the fastest players on the team, Andrew Rogers is penciled in as the other short-stick starter after a strong fall. Frank Dingle is slated to lead the long-sticks at midfield as a three-year letterman. Junior John Moder and freshman Ki Hak Hwang both had strong fall practices and will press for playing time.

Depth at midfield will not be a concern for Coach Bartlett and his staff. Mike Rainwater, a three-time letter winner, is a steady player who returns for his final year for the Keydets will provide a steadying influence with his experience. Steve Schwanke and Doug Locke both had solid freshman years and will be ready to provide more minutes on the field in 1996.

**DEFENSE** - This could be a key area for VMI in 1996 if the Keydets are going to meet their expectations. The top defenseman from last year, Jason Pifer, has graduated and needs to be replaced. Chris Brinkac has lettered his first three years and will take over the reigns of the defensive unit. Andrew Armiger, who has also won three letters and will be starting for the second year, and Tom Peralut should round out the starters. There are some newcomers to watch here, including Josh Chance and John Holmes.

**GOALIES** - Ryan Olson returns in goal for VMI having been a starter for the past two and one-half years. With 496 saves to his credit for his career, he could break the school record of 729. Quick in the goal, he has good size that he is able to use to his advantage between the pipes. Olson was pressed in the fall by junior Charles Ayers, giving the Keydets a top-notch backup to Olson.

If any team has poised itself for success, it's the VMI lacrosse team coming into the 1996 season.

The Keydets are loaded with senior talent and experience this year and will be looking for no less than a national ranking and a shot at breaking the school record for wins, set at 11 in 1988.

With nine starters and 17 lettermen back from a team that tied for the second best record in school history at 9-5, the expectations are high for the 1996 season. As a group, the 12 seniors on the team have seen their win totals rise every year, and this could be the year that all of their hard work and experience pays off on the field.

Not only is VMI deep with battle tested players, Coach Bartlett has brought in a talented group of newcomers this year that should benefit greatly by playing on a team that is this experienced.

The schedule will again be a challenging one, with traditional powers North Carolina, Virginia, Lehigh, and Maryland-Baltimore County providing challenges for the Keydets as they look to build on their success from last year.

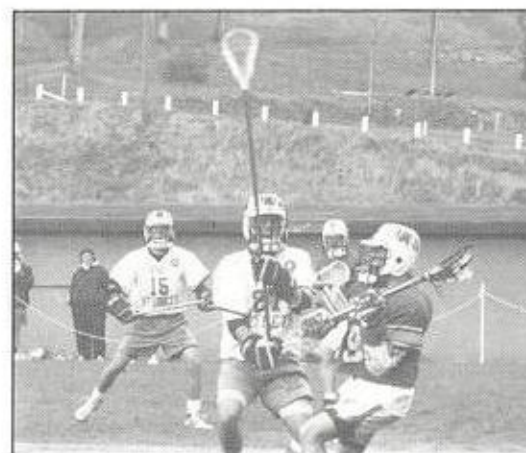


## 27 ANDREW ARMIGER

### VMI's First Varsity Lacrosse Team

1950, the year "The Forgotten War" in Korea began. On the sports front, the Philadelphia Phillies "Whiz Kids" faded into obscurity as the "Fizz Kids" in four straight losses to the New York Yankees in World Series. At VMI, it was the year that lacrosse won recognition as a varsity sport for the first time, getting elevated from club status after two trial years. It was an era in which lacrosse was played with wooden sticks and face-offs were characterized by skilled centers flipping the ball and catching it in mid-air and streaking down the field in a fast break to take a shot on an opponent's goal.

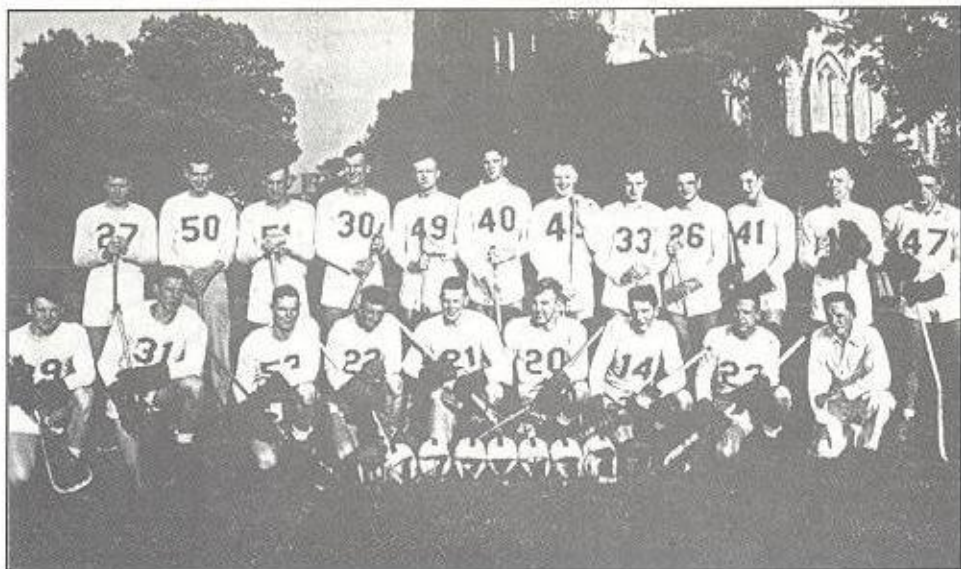
The dynamo for lacrosse gaining recognition as a VMI varsity sport was Frank F. Boehm '508. He not only captained the 1950 varsity team, but served as its assistant manager, administrator, public relations officer and schedule maker. Most importantly, he was the persistent spokesman who persuaded the VMI Athletic Council to sanction lacrosse as a varsity sport in 1950. Boehm, who began playing lacrosse at Brooklyn's Poly Prep continued to play the sport until he was 48!

Captain Walter L. Richards, Jr. '41 of the Biology Department, consented to serve as both coach and faculty advisor during the club years of 1948-49. Upon his departure in 1950 he was succeeded by Lieutenant James D. Ball '49C of the Physics Department, and Colonel George M. Brooke '36 of the History Department as coach and faculty advisor, respectively. Further assistance was rendered by Washington & Lee University - an established lacrosse power in its own right, having placed five of its players on the 1950 All-America list - with encouragement, equipment and scrimmages in which essential fundamentals were freely imparted.

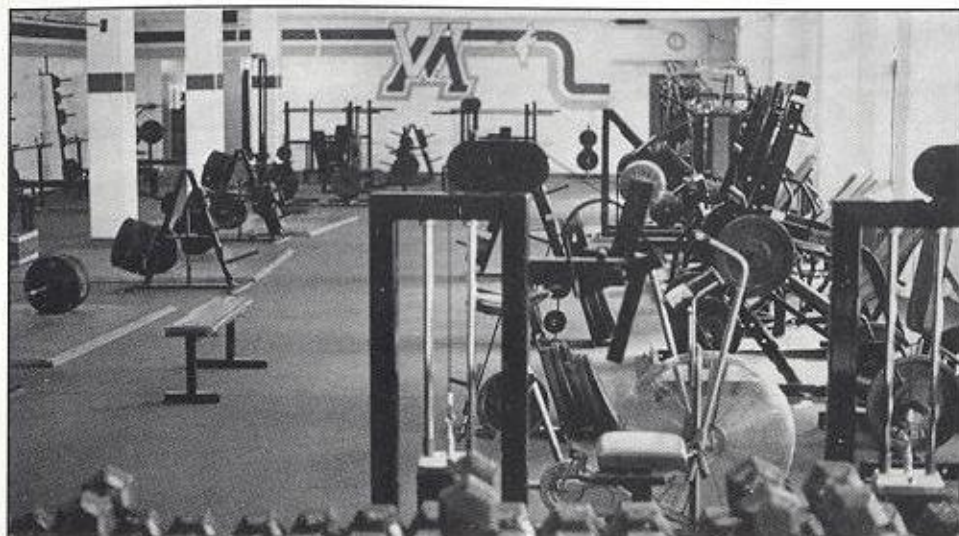
Teams scheduled during those years included North Carolina, Loyola, Delaware, Virginia Tech, William & Mary, and Virginia. The latter, ranked 8th in the top 40 in 1949, narrowly averted defeat that year at the hands of the VMI stickmen, eking out an 11-10 victory. Permanently etched in the memories of the Keydets who played in that game was the goal scored by defenseman Gerry Eggleston '51 who weaved his way over the complete length of a mud-soaked field brought on by a thunderstorm. The stellar play of Homer Ambrose, Eggleston's brother "rat", merited Honorable Mention as a midfielder on the All-Dixie Team that year.

At the end of the 1950 season the final record was 4-6 and 17 cadets from the classes of 1950B, 1951, and 1952 were inducted into the prestigious Monogram Club and awarded their chenille letter, key, and seater.

Lacrosse would not regain its varsity status until the 1983 season. Confidently, it will continue uninterrupted into the next century, thrilling spectators as "America's Fastest Sport On Two Feet!"

The Keydets are fortunate to have two fields which they can call home, each offering a quality surface for VMI lacrosse.

Major games on the schedule are played at Alumni Memorial Field, which has a seating capacity of 10,000, and also serves as the home of the VMI football and track and field programs. With ample seating for fans as well as full press box facilities and a lounge for guests, Alumni Memorial Field has seen some of the best teams in the nation play on its field. In the past the facility has hosted Virginia and is the site every other year for the annual Lee-Jackson clash with neighbor Washington & Lee.

The majority of VMI's home games are played within the cozy confines of Patchin Field, which is alongside the soccer, baseball, and tennis facilities at VMI. Patchin Field, which is built over the top of Woods' Creek, offers separate game and practice fields for VMI lacrosse, and has separate locker room facilities, a training room, and storage space. Plans are in the works to expand the facilities at Patchin Field, further enhancing the facilities VMI is able to offer to the student-athlete.

In 1994 a central irrigation system was installed at Patchin Field, improving the quality of the natural grass playing surfaces.

The field is named after Herb Patchin who was head athletic trainer and director of physical education at VMI for 34 years before his death in 1963. Long-time "clean" of Southern Conference trainers, Herb Patchin was one of 26 original selections to the Helms Hall of Fame for Athletic Trainers, and his name is inscribed in the International Sports Shrine in Los Angeles, California.

In addition to Patchin Field, VMI prides itself on being able to offer its lacrosse student-athletes excellent athletic facilities to develop their maximum potential.

The most extensive capital improvement of VMI athletic facilities, totalling close to \$3 million, took place over the past several years. In 1985, a 7,000 square foot weight room opened in Cocke Hall followed by complete renovation of the outdoor track a year later. Refurbishing of the Patchin Field complex with new locker room facilities for baseball, lacrosse, soccer and tennis was completed five years ago, and construction of a new football field house with press box and Superintendent's level renovation was opened for the 1988 season. The indoor track facility was recovered with a new polyurethane surface recently, and a massive refurbishing of the weight room was initiated, leading to the purchase of new weight training equipment.
